Dr John Leeds is a Consultant Gastroenterologist and Pancreaticobiliary Physician at the Freeman Hospital in Newcastle Upon Tyne with experience in advanced endoscopy including EUS guided sampling and therapeutics, biliary manometry, biliary RFA and Spyglass. He was also part of the team that set up and ran the multidisciplinary chronic pancreatitis clinic. He has published over 40 papers and continues to contribute to the area of pancreaticobiliary medicine. His main areas of interest are advanced EUS/ERCP, exocrine pancreatic disease and endoscopic resection techniques.

After an initial MD investigating the endoscopic diagnosis of small bowel disease, **Professor Andrew Hopper** went on to perform a 18 month advanced endoscopy fellowship at Westmead University Hospital, Sydney, Australia in endoscopic luminal mucosal resection coupled with diagnostic and therapeutic endoscopic ultrasound (EUS). Prof Hopper currently provides specialist therapeutic endoscopy and EUS services to the pancreatic and upper gastrointestinal networks (benign and cancer) for the South Yorkshire region. Professor Hopper became the chair for the Pancreas section of the British Society of Gastroenterology (Sept 2017) and has active research and fellow programme with 80 peer review publications including chronic pancreatitis, pancreatic exocrine insufficiency, endoscopic giant ampullary adenoma removal and complications of acute pancreatitis

Professor Michael Cummings is a Consultant and Honorary Professor in Diabetes and Endocrinology at the Portsmouth Hospitals NHS Trust Queen Alexandra Hospital. He is also an active member of the British Medical Association and Diabetes UK. Professor Cummings' major areas of interest in diabetes are linked to cardiovascular disease and risks (in particular, dyslipidaemia and microalbuminuria), pancreatic exocrine insufficiency in diabetes, the effects of diabetes on pregnancy and erectile dysfunction. He also has a special endocrine interest in thyroid nodules, endocrine fertility and hypogonadism.
